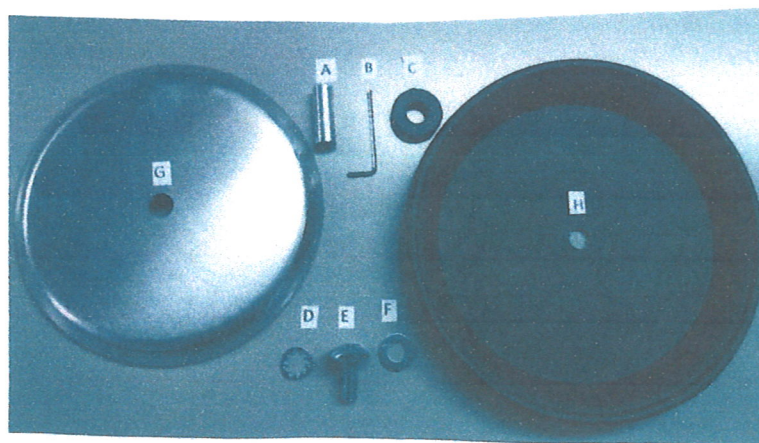


FIXING INSTRUCTIONS FOR 70 & 110Kg BINS

Check bin size; Kit A 70Kg (140Litre) width 49cm depth 55cm height 106cm

Kit B 110Kg (240Litre) width 58cm depth 74cm height 106cm

- 1 Turn the WHEELIE BIN upside down (making sure it is empty first)
- 2 Locate the 'sprue' in the centre of the bin (the piece of plastic that sticks up like a finger)
Note; if the sprue has broken off or does not exist refer to number 6.
- 3 Locate the aluminium tube (A) which has a hole drilled across the end.
- 4 Insert the 'L' shaped key (B) through the hole in the aluminium tube and place on the sprue.
- 5 Turn the key clockwise pressing down to form a thread on the sprue. Stop turning when the tube has reached the bottom of the sprue. Just turn a further half turn so the tube is firmly attached. Do not over tighten.
- 6 If the sprue has broken off, drill 10mm hole through the centre of the bin and screw the aluminium tube (A) on to the screw supplied(E) placing the serrated washer(D) over the thread first.
Note; if you can't reach the bottom of the Wheelie Bin try attaching the screw to the end of broom handle with sticky tape or plasticine. Place the washer (F) over the screw then screw the aluminium tube (A) on the screw using the 'L' shaped key and tighten.
- 7 Place the shaped domed spacer (G) over the aluminium tube with the edges facing down.
- 8 Place the plastic plate (D) over the tube on top of the spacer with its edges uppermost.
Note; It helps if grease or Vaseline is spread between the domed plate and the plastic plate
- 9 Slide the plastic collar (C) over the tube and tighten the screw in the collar with the 'L' shaped key to hold in place.
- 10 Check the plate is free to turn.
- 11 Turn the Wheelie Bin up the right way and check that by tilting it slightly towards you, it can be spun round lifting the wheels off the ground.
It's probably worth identifying your bin with your house number to insure it's returned to your property.



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
